AOFOG was strongly represented at FIGO 2025, where many members of the Executive Board and Committee Chairs actively contributed to scientific and leadership activities. In addition, AOFOG featured prominently at national society conferences in Sri Lanka, Thailand, and the Philippines.

A major highlight of this quarter was the successful convening of the Executive Board Meeting (EBM) and the 2025 Council Meeting in Colombo, Sri Lanka, hosted alongside the Annual Congress of the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (SLCOG).

Executive Board Meeting (EBM)

The EBM was held on **4 September 2025** at the headquarters of the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, where the AOFOG Secretariat is located. The President and Officers of SLCOG graciously welcomed Executive Board members to the venue.

Report of the Ultrasound Committee

AOFOG-SCGO Ultrasound Outreach 11-12 October 2025, Phnom Penh, CAMBODIA

The AOFOG Ultrasound Committee, in collaboration with the Societe Cambodgienne de Gynecologie et d'obstetrique (SCGO), successfully conducted a comprehensive two-day Ultrasound Outreach program and Training of Trainers (ToT) workshop in Phnom Penh. The event was specifically designed to enhance the knowledge and practical skills of regional obstetricians and gynaecologists in ultrasound techniques. The overwhelming attendance, with over 250 delegates present on-site and 120 joining virtually, underscored the urgent need for and strong interest in high-quality ultrasound education in the region. For context, the SCGO has about 500 members.

The event commenced with a welcoming address by SCGO President H.E Professor Koum Kanal, Undersecretary of MOH H.E Prof Kruy Leang Sim and local organizing Chair Professor Korn Aun. AOFOG Ultrasound Chairperson Dr Voon Hian Yan extended greetings from the President Dr John Tait and Secretary-General Dr Rohana, and outlined AOFOG's commitment to regional training initiatives.

Day 1: Fetal and Maternal Ultrasound

The first day focused heavily on fetal assessment and anomaly screening. Dr. Voon initiated the program with a session on fetal biometry and liquor volume: How to improve precision, followed by Dr. Vo Ta Son's presentation on midtrimester anomaly screening. Subsequent core sessions covered the systematic approach to cardiac screening, including the 4 chamber view and outflow tracts. A key educational component was the live demonstration which was also streamed across the virtual platform. The afternoon sessions broadened the scope to include Doppler ultrasound across the trimesters, screening for fetal CNS anomalies and ISUOG guidelines on twins. The latter part of the day was dedicated to a three-hour intensive Training of Trainers (ToT) session, divided into three practical stations: Biometry & Anomalies/Multiple Pregnancies, Arterial and Venous Dopplers, and Fetal Heart.

Day 2: Early Pregnancy and Gynaecological Ultrasound

The second day shifted focus towards early pregnancy and gynaecological pathology. Professor Liona Poon led the morning with First trimester ultrasound: What's practical and feasible? which was complemented by Live demonstration 2: First trimester ultrasound. Other high-impact topics included Caesarean scar ectopic: Diagnostic and Screening Algorithm (Dr. Voon) and the critical assessment of Placenta accreta spectrum (Dr. Son). Gynaecological ultrasound was covered in the session on the IOTA classification for ovarian tumours (Dr. Voon). The afternoon concluded with the second Training of Trainers (ToT) session, featuring hands-on learning across three different stations: First trimester ultrasound, Fetal heart, and Fetal CNS. The high energy and engagement displayed by all participants, even during the practical afternoon ToT sessions, were highly motivating for the international trainers. The structured approach combining focused lectures, live demonstrations, and practical station-based training proved to be extremely effective in bridging the knowledge and skill gaps identified in the region.

Recommendations/Remarks:

The combination of lectures, two live demonstrations, and dedicated, structured Training of Trainers

(ToT) sessions over two afternoons provided an optimal balance of didactic and practical learning, which should be replicated in future outreach events. Given the substantial number of virtual attendees (120), future events should plan for greater interactive engagement options for the online audience to maximise their learning opportunity. Discussion is under way to explore how further support can be provided to Cambodian doctors in 2026.

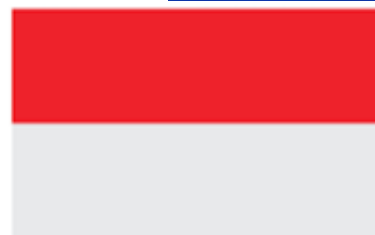
Upcoming activities

Report of the Gynaecological Oncology Committee

The Oncology Committee has been actively involved in activities held by the various national societies. First, Dr. Ka Yu Tse (Chair, Oncology Committee) was invited to deliver a virtual talk on 'Tips and Trouble-shooting for set up of Robotic Cancer Surgery' for the International Summit on Women's Health and Rights, organised by the Federation of Obstetric & Gynaecological Societies of India (FOGSI) & the Mumbai Obstetric & Gynaecological Society (MOGS) on 31 Aug 2025 (Fig. 1). The meeting was endorsed by the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO). During the meeting, Dr. Tse shared the experience how to set up the robotic services in developing countries.

Immediately following the above, the Oncology Committee joined the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (SLCOG) to hold an AOFOG session for the SLCOG 58th Annual Academic Congress in Colombo, Sri Lanka, on 6 Sep 2025. The theme was 'Update on the management of endometrial cancer', and it was chaired by Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa (Secretary General, AOFOG) and Prof. Tsung Hsien Su (President-elect, AOFOG). There were three lectures, including 'Role of ultrasound endometrial carcinoma' by Prof. Christia Padolina (Treasurer, AOFOG), 'Fertility-sparing treatment in early-stage endometrial cancer' by Prof. Budi Wiweko (Chair, REI Committee), and 'Molecular profiling in endometrial cancer' by Dr. Ka Yu Tse (Fig. 2). The conference was very well attended and there was a lot of vivid discussion between the participants and the speakers.

Prof. S Sampathkumari, member of the Oncology Committee, together with the Obstetrics & Gynaecological Society of Southern India, organized the Exclusive CME on Gynaecological Oncology Seminar in Chennai, India, on 14 Sep 2025. The Chair of the Oncology Committee delivered a talk on 'Immunotherapy in endometrial cancer' virtually (Fig. 3). Prof. Aliya Aziz, another member of the Oncology Committee, held the 'Raising Awareness. Inspiring Action: World Gynecological Cancer Awareness month' CME activity in Karachi, Pakistan, on 27 Sep 2025. It was a whole day meeting. Dr. KY Tse chaired two sessions on cervical cancer and ovarian cancer, respectively, and gave a lecture on 'Conservative management of endometrial hyperplasia and endometrial cancer', and (Fig. 4). During the conference, Prof. Aziz, Dr. Lumaan Sheikh, Chair, Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology, Aga Khan University), Prof. Rubina Sohail (President-elect, Society of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists of Pakistan), and other doctors, shared their gynaecological oncology training programme and the cervical cancer prevention programme in Pakistan. This deepened the relationship and understanding between the AOFOG and the SOGP. It was also a great pleasure to learn that Pakistan launched her first national HPV vaccination programme in Sep 2025 under the assistance of the World Health Organization (WHO) and the GAVI.

In the XXV FIGO 2025 held in Cape Town, South Africa, on 7 Oct 2025, there was a WHO headline session, 'FIGO/ WHO symposium: Can we eliminate cervical cancer by the year 2030?', and it was chaired by Prof. Sarikapan Wilailak. Dr. Ka Yu Tse gave a talk on 'Integrating Community Engagement: Mobilizing for Awareness and Acceptance', highlighting the previous effort of the AOFOG in combating cervical cancer (Fig. 5).

Ongoing / Upcoming activities

The Oncology Committee will join the Cervical Cancer Elimination Working Group to hold the AOFOG–POGS 2025 Cervical Cancer Elimination Summit, on 26 Nov 2025. The update of HPV vaccination will be reviewed, followed by panel discussions on the current practices in different countries.

The AOFOG-ASGO Gynecologic Oncology Research Workshop is organized by the Oncology committee of the AOFOG and the Education committee of the Asian Society of Gynecologic Oncology (ASGO). It is supported by the Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Hong Kong (OGSHK) and the Asia-Pacific Gynecologic Oncology Trials Group. There are 30 participants from different countries in Asia. Nearly 40 experts from different fields have helped running this workshop, including gynecologic oncologists, medical oncologists, radiologist, biostatisticians and epidemiologists. Five series of pre-workshop webinars and mentoring sessions had been or nearly completed. The face-to-face workshop with lectures and round-table discussions will be held on 10 – 13 Dec 2025 (Fig. 6). Apart from lectures, the participants will develop their protocols with the assistance of their mentors and the biostatisticians. Finally, selected participants will have chance to present their proposal and win an award.

Cancer genetics is getting more and more important in the modern care of gynecologic cancers. Genetic testing not only guides the selection of targeted therapies or immunotherapy for cancer patients, but also helps identify individuals at risk for hereditary conditions, enabling the counseling and consideration of preventive strategies for carriers. To understand the different practices of genetic testing services in the Asia-Oceania region, the Oncology Committee has launched a survey, aiming to evaluate the current landscape and identify any unmet needs of genetic testing for gynecologic cancers within this diverse region. We invite healthcare professionals and stakeholders to participate in this important survey. The questionnaire can be conveniently accessed via the provided QR code (Fig. 7) or through the following link, which will remain active until Mar 2026:

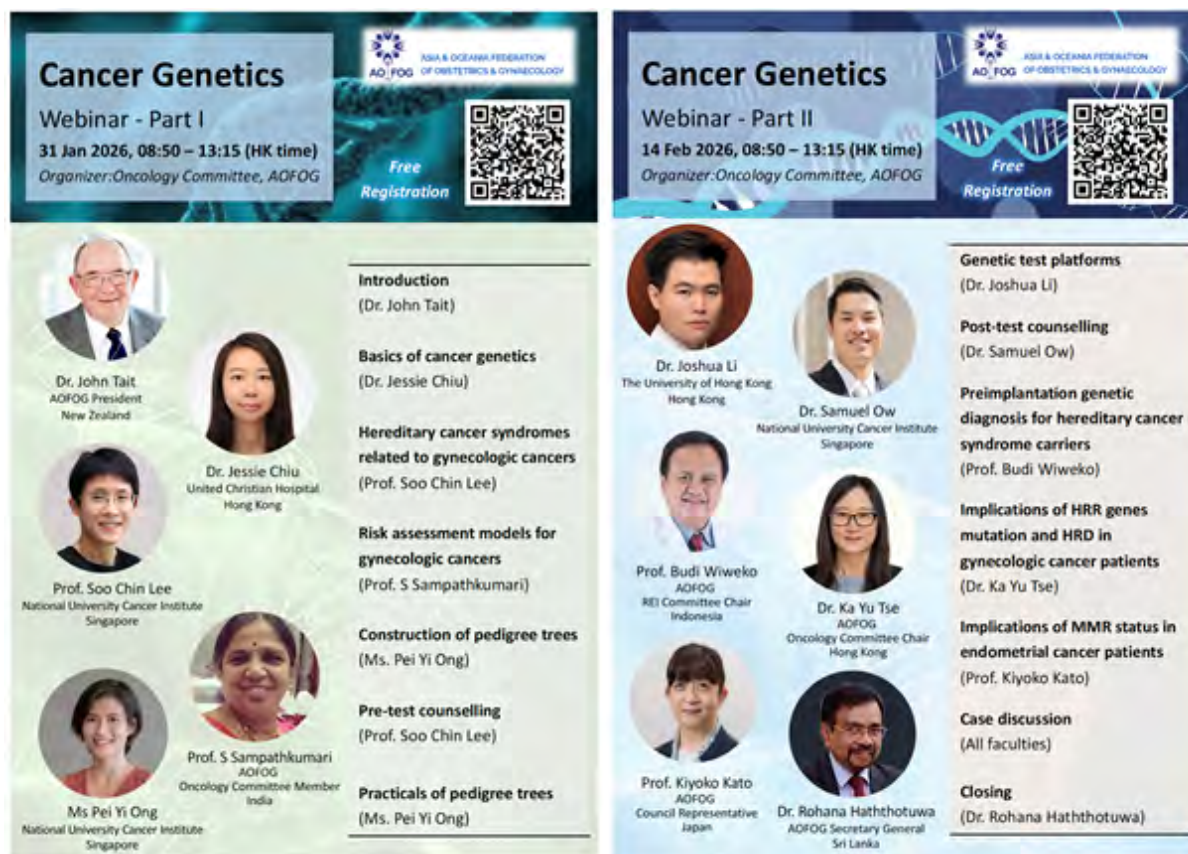


Fig. 8 – AOFOG Cancer genetics webinars on 31 Jan and 14 Feb 2026

Report of the Sexual & Reproductive Health (SRH) Committee and Violence Against Women (VAW) Working Group

1. AOFOG Session at the 40th Scientific Annual Meeting of the The Royal Thai College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RTCOG 2025)

The Royal Thai College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RTCOG) hosted its annual scientific meeting on 28 October – 31 October 2025, at the Dusit Thani Hotel in Pattaya, Thailand. Over 1,300 participants have joined this event.

On 30 October, the SRH Committee organized a session titled “Climate, Cancer, and Collaboration”. The session featured the following presentations:

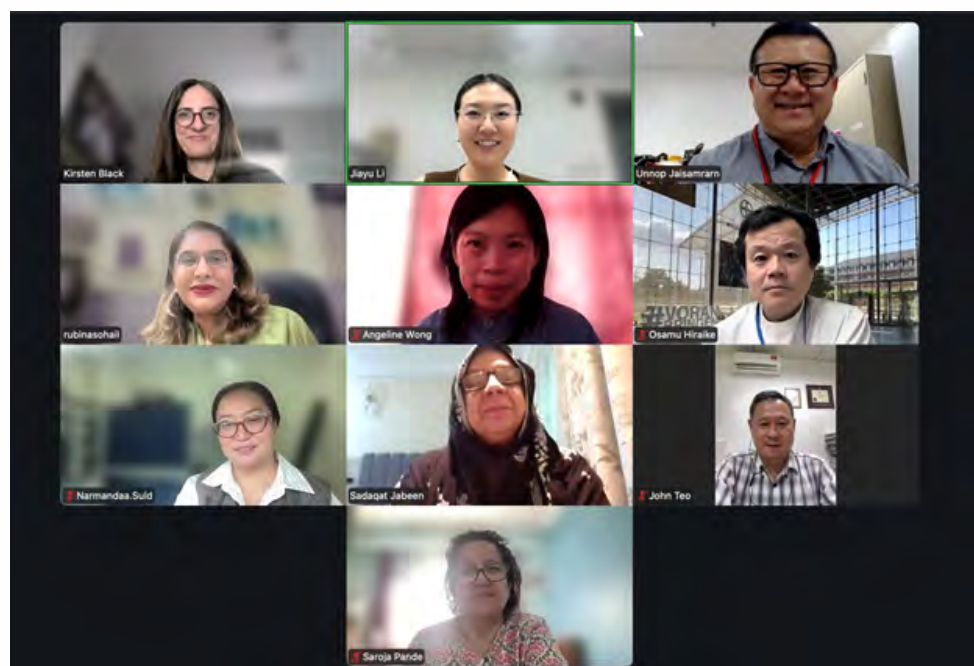

Preparations are underway for upcoming publications based on its findings.

Report of the REI Committee

1. REI FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The AFOG REI Committee has been preparing for the Fellowship Clinical Training. This training program, which is planned to start first in Taiwan, offers a valuable opportunity for foreign physicians to gain specialized clinical exposure in reproductive endocrinology and infertility at National Taiwan University Hospital (NTUH). The program, designed for physicians who have completed at least one year of OB-GYN residency, provides 1–3 months of observer-based clinical training focused on learning and professional development. Tuition fees are waived, and participants are responsible for their living expenses, estimated at USD 620–650 per month.

Applicants are advised to begin preparations 4–6 months before the intended start date, as the process includes document submission and review by the Taiwan government. The fellowship emphasizes careful completion of requirements, including certified English translations of non-English documents. NTUH provides a vibrant training environment complemented by the rich cultural experience of living in Taiwan. Participants can look forward to efficient public transport, comfortable accommodation options nearby, and opportunities to explore Taiwan's food, culture, and attractions during their stay.

2. AFOG CAMPUS 5

The REI Committee of AFOG has been actively preparing for the upcoming AFOG Campus 5, themed “Poor Ovarian Response: Cutting-Edge Approaches for Poor Responders in Fertility Treatment,” which will take place on December 21, 2025, at the ITC Grand Chola Hotel, Chennai. The committee has been coordinating closely with international speakers, finalizing the scientific program, and arranging logistical details to ensure a successful and impactful event.

This year's Campus will feature distinguished experts from across the Asia-Oceania region, including Prof. John Tait (New Zealand), Prof. Budi Wiweko (Indonesia), Dr. Rohana Haththotuwa (Sri Lanka), Dr. Nandita Palshetkar (India), Dr. Miyuki Harada (Japan), and Dr. Mukhri Hamdan (Malaysia). The sessions will cover a wide range of topics—from genomics and artificial intelligence to personalized medicine and ovarian aging—culminating in a panel discussion on future directions in fertility treatment. With the dedicated efforts of the REI Committee and support from AFOG leadership, this event is set to foster meaningful collaboration and advance reproductive medicine in the region.

Report of the Maternal Fetal Medicine Committee

The AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine Committee met on 16 September 2025 via Zoom to advance key regional initiatives in maternal health. The committee confirmed final approval of the postpartum haemorrhage study protocol and supporting documents, and member countries were encouraged to begin IRB submissions, engage hospitals, and commence prospective data collection using consecutive sampling to achieve one thousand cases per site. The committee also continued refining the AOFOG statement on rising Caesarean section rates, emphasising the need for national monitoring, wider adoption of the Robson ten group classification system, and the importance of avoiding unnecessary Caesarean deliveries in accordance with international guidance.



The Chair and members of the AOFOG MFM Committee convened during the MFM Committee meetings via Zoom.

The committee also discussed preparations for the AOFOG 2026 Congress in Sydney, noting that the proposed pre meeting workshop requires further alignment with the Local Organising Scientific Committee to avoid duplication of content. Alternative options under consideration include an interactive workshop on the Robson classification system and the possible integration of newer analytical approaches such as C WHY, C NOT and C SAFE. Plans for forthcoming educational activities, including webinars on postpartum haemorrhage, maternal anaemia and obstetric emergencies, were reviewed to support capacity building across member countries.

Recent past activities for AOFOG MFM Sessions

1. The AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine sessions were held on 23 and 24 August 2025 at the Parkroyal on Beach Road, Singapore, in conjunction with the Singapore International Congress of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, supported by AOFOG and the Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society of Singapore. Under the theme Leading the Change: Empowering Women's Health Through Innovation and Sustainability, the programme featured an AOFOG plenary lecture on the WHO Roadmap on Postpartum Haemorrhage delivered by a distinguished international expert. The AOFOG MFM session included a welcome address from the AOFOG Secretariat, followed by presentations on Saving Lives with the EMOTIVE Bundle, Prevention of Postpartum Haemorrhage, Placenta Accreta Spectrum, Labour Ward Drills and Obstetric Emergencies Leading to Postpartum Haemorrhage, and the implementation of a ROTEM and fibrinogen postpartum haemorrhage protocol. These sessions brought together regional leaders to share evidence based approaches and innovations aimed at improving maternal care across Asia Oceania.



The Chair and members of the AOFOG MFM Committee delivered presentations at the Singapore International Congress of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (SICOG) in Singapore.

2. The AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine Committee organised a webinar titled Care Bundle Approach and Beyond: Saving Lives in Postpartum Haemorrhage on 30 August 2025, held from 1500 to 1630 Singapore Time, with a total of 108 participants. The session began with an opening address by the AOFOG leadership, followed by presentations on the epidemiology and prevention of postpartum haemorrhage, the application of the E MOTIVE bundle, and appropriate escalation measures following E MOTIVE. The programme concluded with a panel discussion and question and answer session featuring members of the Maternal Fetal Medicine Committee, moderated by the committee chair, and ended with closing remarks from the AOFOG executive. This webinar provided an important platform for sharing evidence based strategies to strengthen postpartum haemorrhage management across the region.

Professor Joong Shin Park (Vice-President, AOFOG), Professor Mahesh Choolani (Chair, MFM Committee), Dr. U.D.P. Ratnasiri (Advisor, MFM Committee), Dr. Raul M. Quillamor (Member, MFM Committee), and Dr. Vicky Ho Miaw Ping (Member, MFM Committee) delivered their presentations during the webinar conducted via the Zoom platform.



3. The AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine sessions were held on 7 September 2025 at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel in Colombo, Sri Lanka, in conjunction with the Fifty Eighth Annual Academic Congress of the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, supported by AOFOG and SLCOG. Centred on the theme Improving Reproductive Health of Women – Opportunities and Challenges: An Evidence Based Approach, the programme opened with welcome addresses from the AOFOG Secretariat and the leadership of SLCOG, followed by an opening address from the Chair of the AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine Committee. The sessions featured a panel discussion with senior regional and international experts, who shared diverse perspectives on advancing reproductive health and strengthening evidence-based practice across the Asia Oceania region.

4. The International Federation of Gynaecology and Obstetrics Annual Congress was held in Cape Town, South Africa, from 5 to 9 October 2025, and featured a dedicated AOFOG Maternal Fetal Medicine session. The programme opened with a welcome address from the AOFOG leadership and included presentations on the WHO recommendations for intrapartum care aimed at supporting a positive childbirth experience, strategies to reduce Caesarean sections during labour, an examination of the ongoing debate surrounding Caesarean section rates, and a focused discussion on decision making for second stage Caesarean delivery. The session concluded with an interactive question and answer segment. These contributions showcased regional expertise and highlighted current evidence and forward looking perspectives to enhance maternal care within the global obstetric community.

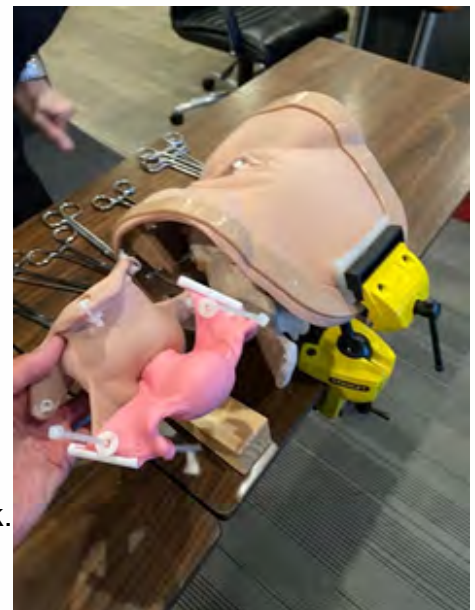
Report of the Urogynecology Committee

The committee on Urogynecology comprises members from Taiwan, Thailand, Singapore, Korea, Indonesia, Malaysia, Japan, Australia, India, Bangladesh, and the Philippines. Our aim is to disseminate knowledge and skills through education, promote collaborations and partnerships, and develop consensus guidelines pertinent to the Asian region.

The committee has been regularly convening virtually and is pleased to report on the following activities held during these past few months.

To enhance awareness of various urogenital conditions, the committee also collaborated with the Royal Thai College of Obstetrics & Gynaecology (RTCOCG) in October 2025 and the Philippine Obstetrical & Gynecological Society (POGS) in Nov 2025.

Last October, the committee held a pre-congress workshop in cooperation with the Royal Thai College of Obstetrics & Gynaecology (RTCOCG). With the help and support of the RTCOCG Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery Committee headed by Prof Suvit Bunyavejchevin, a half-day workshop with didactics and hands-on practice on vaginal hysterectomy, colpocleisis, and cystoscopy. The workshop aimed to update and instruct generalist ob-gynes these procedures through short lectures and hands-on instruction. The workshop was conducted by Suvit Bunyavejchevin, Lisa Prodigididad, and Jennifer King. Lectures on Vaginal Hystrectomy and Colpocleisis were also given by Lisa Prodigididad and Jennifer King. We were graciously welcomed by the RTCOCG President Professor Emeritus Sarikapan Wilailak.

The AOFOG Urogynecology Committee also held a webinar on Minimally Invasive Surgery and Pelvic Organ Prolapse last 08 Nov 2025 with speakers from the Philippines, Thailand, and Japan. The topics covered anatomy of pelvic support, surgical anatomy, laparoscopy, robotic surgery, and even mesh complications. Participants came from various member countries as Thailand, Philippines, Japan, Malaysia, and Indonesia.

Last November, the committee also participated in the Annual Convention of the Philippine Obstetrical & Gynecological Society (POGS). A lecture on "Recurrent UTI – Can it be stopped?" during the plenary session was given by Prof Chris Chong.

The Mongolian Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology (MFOG) is a professional, non-governmental organization established in 1989, representing over 600 obstetricians and gynecologists. Its primary aim is to enhance maternal healthcare and safeguard women's health through the improvement of medical professionals' knowledge and skills.

The Federation elects its President every three years. On November 15, 2025, the 6th Congress of the Election Commission took place at the National Center for Maternal, Newborn and Women's Health, attracting over 150 obstetrician-gynecologists.

This event showcased the growing engagement of Federation members in its activities and electoral processes. Dr. Urjindelger.Ts (MD, PhD, Clinical Professor), the MFOG's President, presented operational and financial reports covering the years 2022-2025, highlighting significant achievements. The MFOG has made substantial strides in strengthening international relations, notably partnering with the Asia and Oceania Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology. It has organized various conferences and developed more than 40 training courses aimed at enhancing the skills of medical professionals. In 2024-2025, the MFOG will serve as the implementing partner organization for UNFPA, facilitating training in emergency obstetric care, reproductive health services for victims of violence, and the evaluation of ultrasounds and CTG across 20 soums in 10 provinces and two districts in Ulaanbaatar. Current initiatives include the implementation of "Respectful Maternity Care" in collaboration with the Australian Government, the Australian Alumni Association, and the Zorig Foundation, as well as the "Uniting for Quality" project with AOFOG to improve maternity care quality.

MFOG's members have actively participated in international congresses (FIGO-2023, AOFOG-2024, FIGO-2025), fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange.



The organization successfully conducted live lectures featuring OB/GYN experts, enhancing communication and sharing research insights.

A medical degree examination yielded 82 qualified (second degree) doctors, alongside 23 first degree doctors and 6 consultant doctors.

The MFOG promotes camaraderie through traditional sports days and hosts a New Year's party to acknowledge outstanding contributions among its members.

During the recent elections, Dr. Unurjargal.D, a devoted consultant gynecologist at Urguu Maternity Hospital, has been elected as the President of the MFOG for the next three years. This transition signals a continued commitment to excellence in healthcare and teamwork among professionals.

News from RANZCOG

For many years, there has been a demand for fetal surveillance education in the Pacific. With support from the Mukhtiar and Raghbir Sidhu RANZCOG Asian and Pacific Developing Countries Education Grant, RANZCOG is now rolling out a fetal surveillance education program across the Pacific.

The program involves the annual delivery of the [Fetal Surveillance Education Program \(FSEP\) workshop](#) for three years in six Pacific Island countries, tailored to the needs of Pacific O&G doctors and midwives and adapted to the environments in which they practice.

The first year of the program is now underway. The FSEP workshop was delivered to two groups of O&G doctors and midwives—29 clinicians overall—in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea in October 2025. The workshop will be delivered in 2026 in Tonga in February, Kiribati in March, Fiji in April, Solomon Islands in May, and Samoa in June. The FSEP workshop will also be delivered at the [Pacific Society for Reproductive Health Biennial Conference](#) in Tonga in September 2026.

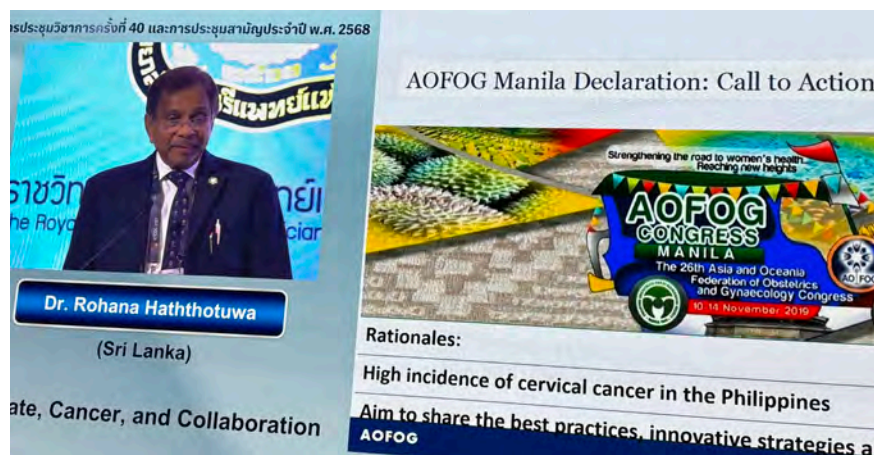
